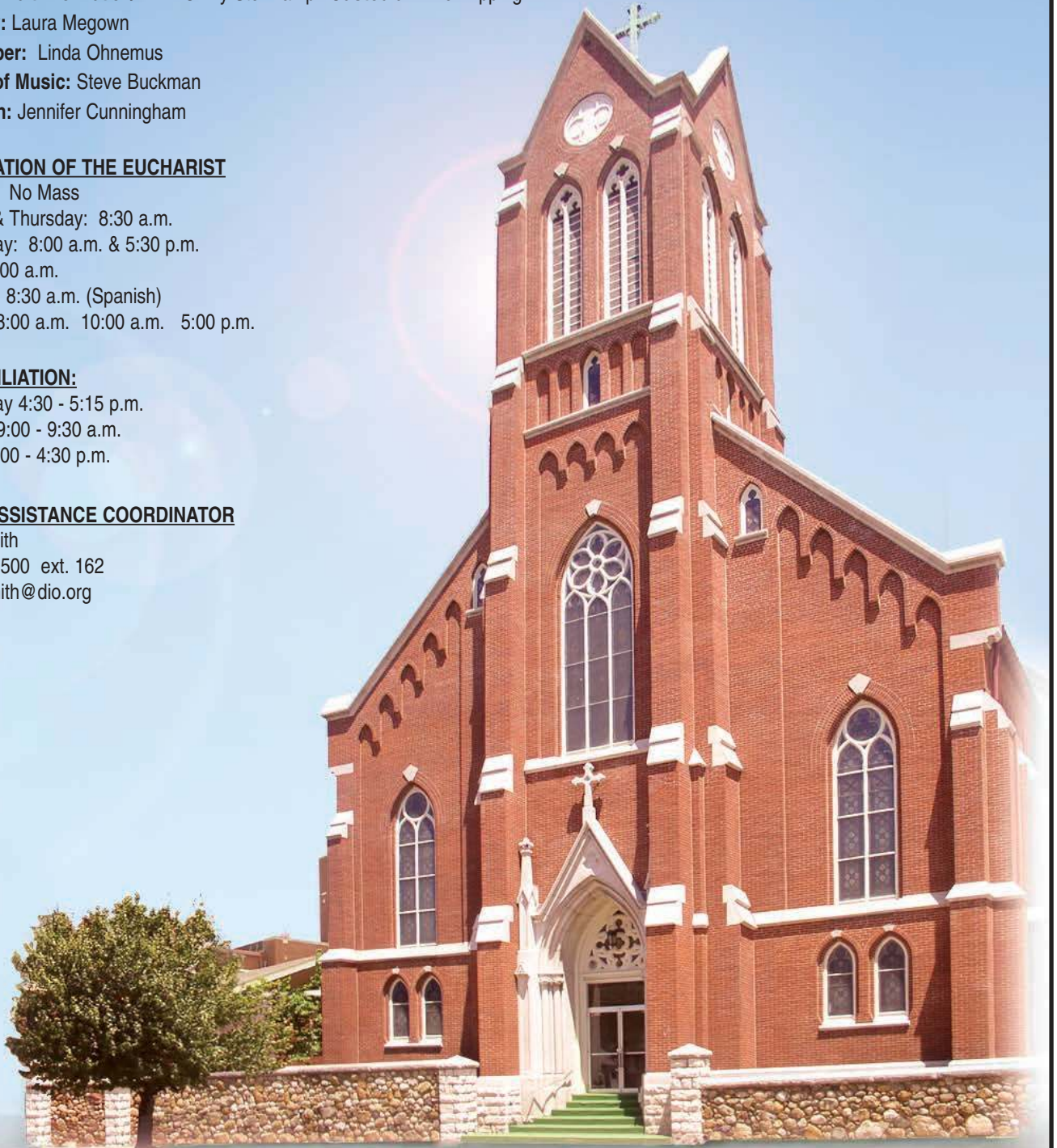

**Happy Easter!** Today we celebrate Christ's triumphal victory over death. Alleluia! He shares this glorious victory with us through baptism which leads us to the same new Life of the Resurrection. For the next fifty days of Easter we are invited to meditate on the power of our own Baptism and the New Life that springs forth from it. Alleluia!

I would like to congratulate our **Newest Members of the Catholic Faith**. At the Easter Vigil this weekend we welcome new members into the fullness of the Catholic faith through the Easter sacraments. I am very proud of our new Catholics and I look forward to watching their continued growth in the Catholic faith in the years to come. "May God who has begun the good work in you bring it to fulfillment."

Beginning next Sunday, April 11, **Bishop Paprocki is returning the obligation for Catholics in our Springfield Diocese to attend Sunday Mass** with the following exceptions:

- . Those 65 years old and older.
- . Those at risk due to underlying medical conditions.
- . Those who have significant fear about returning, but do not qualify in the above, may speak to their pastor about an individual dispensation.

Bishop has also communicated the importance for **those who are ill or have a fever have the moral obligation to stay home** so as not to put others at risk.

In order to increase our own parish capacity for more parish members to attend, our parish is implementing the following **Seating policy effective this Easter Sunday**:

The ribbons on the back 50% of Church, and in the choir loft, will be removed. Participants in these seats will not need to social distance.

The ribbons on the front 50% of Church will remain. Persons wishing to sit in the front 50% will continue to social distance. They are asked to come 15 minutes before each Mass, to give time for ushers to seat them.

The requirement for all to wear facemasks will remain in effect, regardless of where they are seated in church.

# 'Tis the Easter Season

*Here's your friendly reminder that we get to celebrate Easter for the next 50 days!*

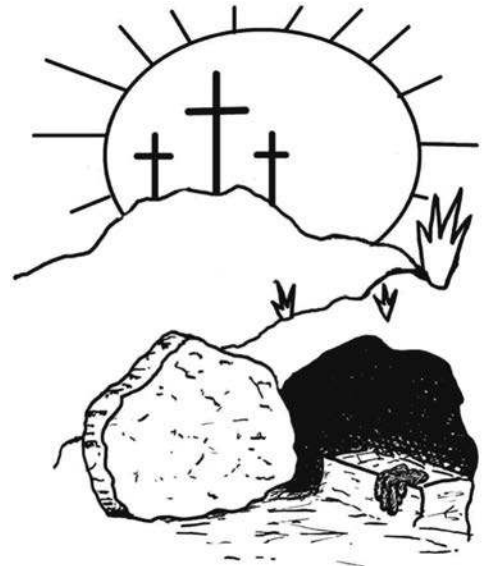


## **Easter Is 50 Days, So Party On!**

Eastertide, or the Easter season, is the period of time between Easter Sunday and Pentecost Sunday. If the Easter Vigil is the “Mother of all vigils,” then Easter Sunday is the greatest of all Sundays, and Eastertide is the greatest of all liturgical seasons. The USCCB’s website says, “Easter is the celebration of the Lord’s resurrection from the dead, culminating in his Ascension to the Father and sending of the Holy Spirit upon the Church.” This time is characterized in light of the glorified life and Christ’s ultimate victory over sin and the grave. **The Octave of Easter** is the 8 Days beginning with the First Sunday of Easter to the Second Sunday of Easter. Each day of the Octave is like a little Sunday and an outlet of celebration for our joy for Christ’s Resurrection!

## **The Meaning of Easter**

“Easter” is derived from the old English word for “east.” The sun which rises in the East bringing light, warmth, and life to the Earth reminds of Christ who brings light, truth, and new life to us. Tradition tells us to watch for Christ to come again in the East. So does Scripture. Matthew 24:27 says, “For as the lightning comes from the east and shines as far as the west, so will be the coming of the Son of man.” The significance of East is everywhere in Catholic Tradition and Liturgy. The Garden of Eden was planted in the East. Our tabernacle and Sanctuary are oriented towards the East. Ad Orientem, Latin for “to the East,” describes the Tradition of priests facing East when their prayers are directed towards God rather than exhortations to the congregation. Even many Catholic cemeteries bury Christian deceased facing the East in order to anticipate Christ’s Second Coming.



## **Liturgically Living the Season of Easter**

So you have 50 days to celebrate, now what? How can you celebrate the season of Easter well with your spouse, your family, your friends in these next fifty days? Here are a few ideas:

1. Make Easter about “THE Lamb” and not the bunny
2. Many of you have Lenten altars, change out the decorations to reflect the Easter Season
3. Make a small “Resurrection Garden” of the empty tomb with succulents and moss
4. Decorate an Easter Candle for your home that reminds you of the Paschal Candle at Mass.
5. Join Blessed Sacrament on April 7 from 4-5 for Praise and Worship and Blessed Sacrament to thank God for His Sacrifice and Resurrection
6. Make “Resurrection Rolls” or “Empty Tomb Rolls” with your kids (you can find the recipe easily on google)
7. Decorate Easter Eggs with religious symbols
8. Make a washable stained glass window in your home
9. When planting Springtime plants, pick out a couple with religious significance i.e. Lilies (Resurrection/St. Joseph), Lavender (Our Lady’s drying plant), Hyacinth (Lily among Thorns)
10. Have a faith based movie night, with a movie from Formed.org

# *How to Be More Mindful this Easter*

God shows His love for us in that while we are still sinners, Christ died for us. This Easter, challenge yourself to be more mindful of the ways you live in God's love and presence each day. Easter is a reflection of the depths of God's love for us. The Bible says, "God showed His great love for us by sending Christ to die for us while we were still sinners" (Romans 5:8 NLT). Before you even knew God, before you knew you needed Him in your life, Jesus died for you. If this isn't the greatest example of God's amazing love, I don't know what is. Here are a few ways we can be more mindful this Easter of the ways we live in God's love and presence each day.

## **Be Grateful**

This Easter, create a gratitude list. Write as many things as you can think of that you are grateful for in your life. So many people spend time focusing on the bad things that have happened to them, rather than looking at all of the good things that are happening in their life every single day. Next to each item on the list, write "God is there." The Bible tells us with God, all things are possible (Matthew 19:26). God's love makes all things possible. At the end of writing this list, give thanks to God. Psalm 107:1 says "Give thanks to the LORD, for He is good; His love endures forever." Each time you look over this list, you will be reminded that God is present in all of your circumstances.

## **Pay Attention to the Cross**

We often focus on the cross as a symbol of suffering and sadness, particularly in the days leading up to Easter. Death by crucifixion was one of the most painful experiences imaginable, and Jesus' suffering on the cross was far more excruciating than any suffering most of us will ever face. But the cross represents more than suffering. It is a symbol of the blessings bestowed upon us by God. This Easter, focus on the cross not solely as a symbol of suffering, but a symbol of forgiveness, and God's saving grace. All of our sins were placed on Jesus, and when He suffered and died, He cleansed us of our sins so that we would have new life in Him. The Bible tells us "Since He did not spare even His own Son but gave Him up for us all, won't He also give us everything else?" (Romans 8:32 NLT). Through the cross, we see that even in the harshest of trials will come to you as a blessing, for good, no matter how hard the trial is that you are facing. The cross reminds us to place our faith in a God who is good who loves us mightily.

## **Be Inspired By God's Word**

Think of a Bible verse or passage that speaks to you, and allow these words to inspire you throughout Easter. John 3:16 is a great verse to reflect on particularly at Easter time: "For God so loved the world so much that he gave His one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him will not perish but have eternal life." This verse reminds us that it is only by God's grace – His underserved mercy – that we can have eternal life with Him. Jesus came so that we may have life and have it abundantly (John 10:10). God's never ending grace and forgiveness offers us a life full of blessings and purpose.

## **Take Time to Be Mindful of God's Presence**

If you are like most people in this day in age, you live life on the go. In the chaos of your life, you may sometimes forget to take out time to be mindful of God's presence, or to think about the condition of your soul which thrives on the presence of God. This Easter, be intentional about taking out time for God, especially if you haven't been placing God first on your priority list. This can be a time of prayer with God, or a time of silence and reflection. Don't underestimate the power of prayer, or solitude with God. We are told in James 4:8 "draw near to God, and He will draw close to you." Daily prayer allows us to not only reflect on the daily aspects of our life with God, and share our concerns, but it also reminds us that God is beside us in our circumstances.

## **Live the Good News**

Hardly a day goes by when we are not confronted with the reality of sin and death – in ourselves and around us. This Easter, try to be conscious of the reality of sin and death, and act fearlessly in the face of it. Too many people in our culture deny the reality of sin and death, but our faith gives us another way. Even in the places where we encounter the greatest darkness, brokenness and confusion, we will find God. We discover our Savior in these moments. This is where we experience the Good News. In those every day places – where we experience weakness, emptiness and brokenness – God's love is most powerfully present. When we are attentive in our faith, we see God's grace in every situation: a love the world cannot give.

The message of Easter is death is not the end. Jesus tells us "I am the resurrection and the life. Anyone who believes in me will live, even after dying. Everyone who lives in me and believes in me will never die" (John 11:25-26 NLT). The resurrection of Jesus was the death of death. Grace is God's love in action and we are surrounded by love through God's saving grace. Challenge yourself to commit or recommit to being in a personal relationship with God, who loves without bounds. Be mindful that God is there, in every moment of your life. God not only does not give us more than we can handle. He helps us handle what we are given. Remember God's fulfilled promise of new life through Jesus' death and resurrection, the greatest example of love we can ever know.
